# 5.1 Strategic Priorities Projects—Incremental Information Only

P002—Waste Water Project—Collection System and Treatment. The Project is
estimated at \$26 million to \$31 million. Overland waste water outfall installed on Emergency
Basis; a new underground waste water outfall is being installed—80% complete, and a short overland
extension may have to be used over the winter for the last 34 metres.

# P002—OPTION 2 (REVION 1) is the Preferred Option at this time.

# OPTION 1 – FREE WATER SURFACE WETLAND

This option is a three-step treatment process. Step 1 uses the current lagoon for flow attenuation and primary treatment and constructs a new identical lagoon in parallel to satisfy the municipal wastewater regulation (MWR) redundancy requirements. This will allow Wells operations staff to isolate and dewater each cell to handle operation and maintenance as required.

# OPTION 2 (REVISION 1) - ROTATING BIOLOGICAL CONTACTORS

Option 2 uses rotating biological contactors (RBCs) as the main treatment method. Raw wastewater flows through a screening system to remove any large objects, then proceeds directly to the RBCs. In terms of mechanical wastewater treatment, RBCs are a simple treatment solution that can achieve very good effluent quality. No settling is provided beforehand to minimize heat loss from the wastewater, which has been measured to be seasonally very cold in Wells.




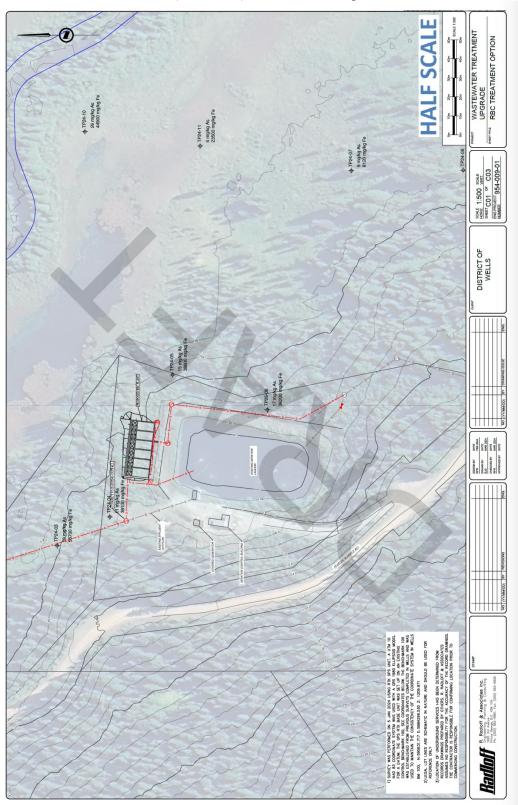
Figure 2: Option 2 - RBC process

# OPTION 3 (REVISION 1) – AERATED LAGOONS AND AERATED SUBSURFACE NITRIFICATION BED

This option involves refurbishing the current lagoon with a new liner and aerators, adding a second larger lined aerated lagoon, and installing a subsurface aerated gravel bed covered with a layer of mulch. A new building would be constructed to house the blowers for the aeration system, replacing the existing structure.


We would like to make the community aware of the activities we have going on over the coming weeks:

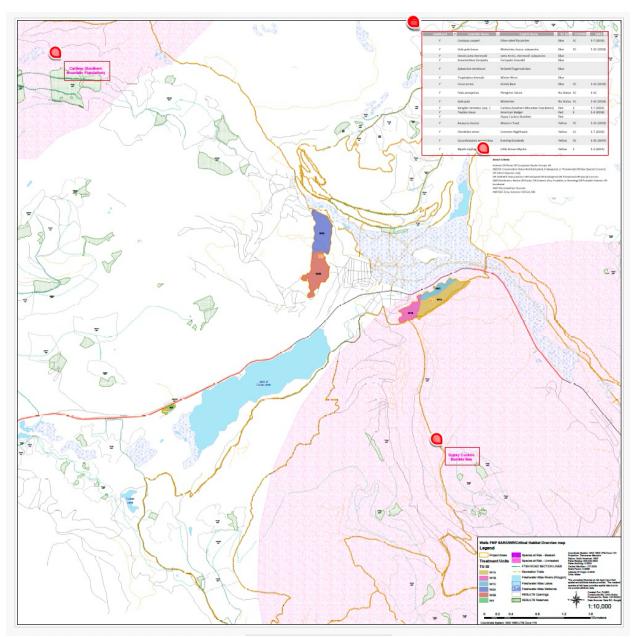

Outfall sewer line (P002) reached 60% completion with 8-inch line being drilled 12 feet underground to Willow River. Project uses 4-inch line temporarily to keep treated effluent moving while waiting for final permits. Two final permits from Ministry of Environment delayed by BCGEU strike, holding up 130-meter underground drilling section. Department of Fisheries signed off on both Wastewater project and Lowhee Dike permits. Director and Assistant Deputy Minister of Environment reviewing October 23<sup>rd</sup>, whether to move to State of Emergency declaration for the 2 delayed permits. Measuring maintenance service hole has been installed which contains computerized electronics to measure flow and volume.

# P014.1 FireSmart (Part 2)

FireSmart project to post Coordinator position before Christmas.

# P016 Province of BC - Housing & BC Housing Project

Mayor Coleman and the CAO met with Terry Waterhouse the new Northern Manager for BC Housing and staffer David Sheach to discuss housing eligibility for a Wells project. BC Housing indicated potential for community project, with subsequent session planned to document opportunities before bringing to Council.

P031 DOW & Partners--Water System Replacement Test Drilling Program & New Water Plant (Osisko)

Osisko posted updates Thursday and Friday about barge deployment for lakebed drilling, tree clearing at Ballarat Camp, septic system work, and core box transfers. Water drilling program by Osisko was approved by Council for additional drilling after completing work in Barkerville Park.

# P023 UBCM 2025 Fire Equipment & Training Grant

The Community Emergency Preparedness Fund Volunteer Fire Department Equipment grant application is nearing completion. Former Fire Chief Brendan Bailey is assisting in this grant preparation. The Wells Barkerville Volunteer Fire brigade reviewed the application with Fire Chief Haleigh Almond on Wednesday night.

Crown lands transfer progress is being delayed by the BCGEU strike.

# P042 Emergency Operation Centre

Emergency Operations Centre focus remains on water management and wildfires, with consideration of cooling centres and highway interruption scenarios.

## P076 Lowhee

Phase 1 near completion with final rock delivery before chain-up season. The Province wants to combine the sediment trap and Lowhee Phase 2 as one permit, as supported by the Assistant Deputy Minister of Environment.

# P013 Wildfire fuel protection

Detailed field work completed on risk blocks, with high-resolution maps and data tables to be shared with Council and the Community Forest board. Project expected to take at least 10 years for Wells community, 25 years for all communities combined.

# 5.2 Strategic Priorities Grant application motion amendment

- UBCM staff requested all applicants refine council motions to explicitly recognize
   UBCM will not fund cost overruns through the Strategic Priorities program
- Prince George and Quesnel were also required to amend their motions
- New motion adds language stating District prepared to cover cost overruns through cash reserves, unallocated grant funds i.e., Community Works funds, or Growing Communities funds
- The District CAO explained transportation projects allow management of cost overruns by reducing scope on components like decorative lighting or sidewalks, etc.
- The CAO expressed confidence that proper project management practice means the District will never need to dip into cash reserves
- Council passed a refined motion replacing previous resolution:

**25- 148 THAT** the following resolution be submitted to UBCM as part of the Strategic Priorities 2025 program funding application:

WHEREAS, the District of Wells recognizes the necessity for improved roadway infrastructure to enhance community safety, accessibility, and economic development;

WHEREAS, the Wells Street Improvement Project aims to upgrade existing roads, install drainage systems, and enhance pedestrian access within the community;

WHEREAS, the project is intended to support local businesses, improve quality of life for residents, and foster community engagement;

WHEREAS, potential cost overruns may occur due to unforeseen circumstances, including but not limited to weather conditions, supply chain disruptions, labor shortages, and regulatory changes;

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. Support for Project: Council hereby supports the Wells Street Improvement Project and authorizes the project team to proceed with the necessary actions to initiate the project.
- 2. Budget Approval: Council approves the initial project budget of \$6,957,993.44, which includes a contingency fund of \$724,714.50 to cover potential cost overruns.
- 3. Cost Overrun Support: The District supports, in addition to a project contingency within the budget, cost overrun protection via access and utilization of operating funds, District cash reserves, un-allocated grant funds held (Community Works, Growing Communities).
- 4. Monitoring and Reporting: The project team shall provide regular updates to Council on the project's progress, including financial reports that detail any potential cost overruns and the measures taken to mitigate them.
- 5. Risk Management: The project team is directed to implement robust risk management strategies to identify, assess, and mitigate the risks of cost overruns throughout the project.
- Community Engagement: The project team shall ensure ongoing communication with stakeholders and the community, providing opportunities for feedback and addressing any concerns that may arise.
- Review of Changes: Any significant changes to the project scope or budget that
  may lead to cost overruns shall be presented to Council for review and approval
  prior to implementation.

Tree removal work on the power line is extensively completed or nearly done, which should help prevent future outages. Councillor Funk raised concern that not all residents equipped to cope with outages if they lack woodstove backup.

- Councillor Funk noted Mary's long record of public service and her commitment to finding feasible solutions for citizens in her community
- Additional information from the family may be shared at the November 4th Council meeting
- Council passed a refined UBCM Strategic Priorities funding motion required by UBCM that explicitly states the District will cover any cost overruns through cash reserves and unallocated grant funds
- Council approved third and final reading of Permissive Tax Exemption bylaw 201 (corrected from bylaw 208) covering 3 nonprofit organizations over 5 years
- Wastewater outfall sewer line project reached 60% completion with 8-inch line drilled 12 feet underground, but 2 final Ministry of Environment permits are delayed by the BCGEU strike
- Facilities, Parks and Recreation Master Plan Open House is scheduled for November 5<sup>th</sup> from 5:00pm to 8:00pm with the consultant, L&M Engineering hosting
- BC Hydro will investigate 3 power outages that occurred within 8 days of each other impacting Wells residents and beyond

# Strategic Priorities project updates

- Wastewater outfall sewer line (P002) reached 60% completion with 8-inch line being drilled 12 feet underground to Willow River
- Project uses 4-inch line temporarily to keep treated effluent moving while waiting for final permits
- 2 final permits from Ministry of Environment delayed by BCGEU strike, holding up 130meter underground drilling section
- Department of Fisheries signed off on both Wastewater project and Lowhee Dike permits
- Director and Assistant Deputy Minister reviewing October 23<sup>rd</sup>, whether to move to State of Emergency declaration for the 2 delayed permits
- Measuring maintenance service hole has been installed which contains computerized electronics to measure flow and volume
- FireSmart project to post Coordinator position before Christmas
- Mayor Coleman and the CAO met with Terry Waterhouse the new Northern Manager for BC Housing and staffer David Sheach to discuss housing eligibility for a Wells project
- BC Housing indicated potential for community project, with subsequent session planned to document opportunities before bringing to Council
- Osisko posted updates Thursday and Friday about barge deployment for lakebed drilling, tree clearing at Ballarat Camp, septic system work, and core box transfers
- Community forest expansion (P0118) is delayed by the BCGEU strike
- The Community Emergency Preparedness Fund Volunteer Fire Department Equipment grant application is nearing completion. Former Fire Chief Brendan Bailey is assisting in this grant preparation.
- The Wells Barkerville Volunteer Fire brigade reviewed the Emergency Plan with current Fire Chief Haleigh Almond
- Water drilling program by Osisko was approved by Council for additional drilling after completing work in Barkerville Park
- Crown lands transfer progress is being delayed by the BCGEU strike

- UBCM staff requested all applicants refine council motions to explicitly recognize UBCM will not fund cost overruns through the Strategic Priorities program
- Prince George and Quesnel were also required to amend their motions
- New motion adds language stating District prepared to cover cost overruns through cash reserves, unallocated grant funds i.e., Community Works funds, or Growing Communities funds
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- The CAO expressed confidence that proper project management practice means the District will never need to dip into cash reserves
- Council passed a refined motion replacing previous resolution

# Permissive tax exemption bylaw

- Council corrected bylaw number confusion between 201 and 208, verifying 201 is the correct number
- Bylaw formatting adjusted to fix redundant clause numbering (1.A appearing multiple times)
- Council completed first and second reading with number and formatting corrections, then passed third and final reading
- Bylaw grants 5-year property tax exemptions to 3 organizations:
  - Wells Historical Society for 2 lots (museum lot and Dry Building lot)
  - Island Mountain Arts Society for 3 properties (Art gallery, Nest building on Sanders, and one unimproved donated lot)
  - Wells Recreation Society for curling club land and improvements

- Exemptions apply only to property tax, not utilities or parcel taxes
- District has long history of awarding these exemptions, and the Community Charter allows amendments over time as circumstances change

# Facilities, Parks and Recreation Master Plan process

- Community Open House scheduled for November 5<sup>th</sup> from 5:00pm to 8:00pm with L&M Engineering Limited, the project consultants, hosting
- Poster about Open House being hand-delivered to every household starting late October
- Data collection will occur at Open House, with community survey as future phase
- The District CAO is managing process with the consultant
- Council requested social media post announcing door-to-door poster distribution
- Information Management Governance workshop with consultant Alison Habkirk rescheduled to November 4th from 10:30am to 1:30pm
- Consultant will contact Council members in advance to introduce herself and possibly assign preparation work

# BC Hydro power outages

- 3 power outages occurred within 8 days: Saturday of Thanksgiving weekend, following Sunday during day for over 3 hours, and overnight that night
- BC Hydro outages map lists cause as "other" with no specific explanation
- Jerry received unconfirmed reports from 2 community members that outages were due to work at Ballarat
- The Mayor noted some planned outages in Quesnel could have affected Wells, though those are typically posted with business notifications
- District staff will follow up with BC Hydro contact Dave Moser for more information
- Tree removal work on the power line is extensively completed or nearly done, which should help prevent future outages
- Councillor Funk raised concern that not all residents equipped to cope with outages if they lack woodstove backup

#### 1. Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

# 2. Description of business

Wells-Barkerville Community Forest Ltd. (the "Corporation") is a wholly owned subsidiary of the District of Wells. The principal place of business is located at 4243 Sanders Road in Wells, British Columbia. The registered office is located at 204-1302 Seventh Avenue, Prince George, British Columbia. Wells-Barkerville Community Forest Ltd. was formed by Articles of Incorporation under the Business Corporations Act of British Columbia, Canada.

The Corporation owns and manages a Community Forest under agreement with the Province of British Columbia and with its sole shareholder, the District of Wells.

The Corporation is classified as a Government Business Entity under the Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standards. As such, these financial statements are prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards. The Corporation is exempt from tax under section 149 of the Income Tax Act (Canada).

## 3. Significant accounting policies

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand less outstanding cheques and deposits with a maturity of less than three months at the time of purchase. When outstanding cheques are in excess of cash on hand, the excess is reported in bank indebtedness.

## Prepaid expenses

Prepaid expenses include insurance and other items paid in advance and are recognized as an expense over the period of expected benefit.

Capital assets are stated at cost or deemed cost less accumulated amortization and are amortized over their estimated useful lives at the following rates and methods:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

The significant accounting policies subject to such judgments and the key sources of estimation uncertainty that, in the Corporation's opinion, could significantly affect the reported results or financial position are the Corporation's potential liability for reforestation expenses in connection with the Community Forest.

#### Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. The Corporation is exposed to credit risk from customers and its cash held in banking institutions. In order to reduce its credit risk, the Corporation reviews a new customer's credit history before extending credit and conducts regular reviews of its existing customers' credit performance. An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based upon factors surrounding the credit risk of specific accounts, historical trends and other information.

There is no change in the risk exposure from the previous period.

#### 10. Contingent liability

On September 1, 2014, the Corporation signed a 25 year Community Forest Agreement with the Province of British Columbia. The agreement provides for the right to harvest timber and subsequently reforest. The corporation has signed a contract with West Fraser in regards to wood harvesting and silviculture in the Community Forest. Under this contract, West Fraser will provide all forest managements services to the Community Forest and will be responsible for utilizing or selling all logs from the Community Forest. The Corporation may be liable for costs to regenerate an area to "free growing" on the Community Forest if an obligation is created by the tenure holder that is outside the scope of the contract with West Fraser. Current agreement with West Fraser was signed October 18, 2018 and expired December 31, 2023. A new management agreement has not been renewed. The Corporation has engaged registered Forester to do the field work in preparation of harvesting. All logging expenses are the responsibility of the Corporation.

The Corporation has not provided for any tax liability as it believes that it is exempt from tax under section 149 of the Income Tax Act (Canada). This exemption is based on the fact that all revenue activities of the Corporation take place within the boundaries of the District of Wells, with the exception of activities that are as a result of an agreement between the Corporation and the Province of British Columbia. The amount of any reassessment; if this exemption was not available, has not been calculated.

#### 11. Financial Risks

Management and monitoring of financial risks is performed by the Corporation's management, which manages all financial exposures and reports annually to the Board of Directors.

The Corporation's management does not believe it has any significant credit risk, liquidity risk, market risk, currency risk, or interest rate risk, as the Corporation does not have any significant borrowings or foreign currency holdings.

### **Topic - Cariboo Gold Project (Wells, BC)**

Background: (from the MACC Meeting Request):

The Cariboo Gold Project will have a huge impact on the District of Wells, in which a major industrial site, the Mine Site Complex will be located, along with other mining-related activities.

- The regulatory framework consists of: Environmental Assessment Certificate (M23-01) issued by the Province after a three+ year environmental assessment
- Mines Act Permit (M-247),
- Environmental Management Act Permits (PE-111511 Mine Site Complex and PE-17686 Bonanza Ledge).

We seek: 1) clarification on conditions in the conditions and regulations for the mine 2) clarification on Environmental Amendment process for M23-01; 3) better understanding of how Compliance and Enforcement process works for the EAC and Permit requirements

**Meeting Purpose:** To demonstrate that the Cariboo Gold Project Mine Site Complex (MSC) is visibly *in* Wells, not merely *near* it; yet its local government, the District of Wells (DoW) has mostly been left out of consultation and information sharing in EAC and permit conditions for the Project (among other issues); with the goal of getting this fixed, so we are treated as a key stakeholder. We also seek clarification on the EAC amendment process and a better understanding of Compliance and Enforcement for the EAC and Permit requirements.

### **Key points**

- Began by asking asking if anyone has been to Wells, followed up by showing aerial views of
  the current town site and a visual rending of the MSC, its footprint half the size of Wells, and
  its proximity to homes and buildings.
- (Lack of) Consultation and information sharing with the District of Wells. This mine impacts
  the very fabric of our town. Yet, DOW not treated as a stakeholder/most impacted
  community.
- <u>Environmental Assessment Certificate M23-01</u> District of Wells is not required to be consulted for most of the management plans in Schedule B Table of Conditions, just the Community Effects Management Plan, Drinking Water and Water Treatment and one more. In EAC M23-01, DoW is excluded from consultation for:
  - #9. Independent Environmental Monitor terms of engagement (B-7)
  - #10. Construction Environment Management Plan (B-9
  - #11. Care and Maintenance Plan (B-10)
  - #13. Environmental Effects Management Plan (B-11)
  - #14. Caribou Mitigation and Monitoring Plan (B-13)
  - #17. Health and Medical Services Plan (B-19)
  - #19. Human Health Monitoring and Management Plan (B-21)
  - #21. End Land Use Plan
- Environmental Management Act Permit PE-111511 DoW is totally missing from being included. Yet, as the permit states, the gold mine is located \*in\* Wells, BC. (this is the only mention of Wells). This major industrial infrastructure is being built in our town, yet, for instance, we have no representation on the Environmental Monitoring Board (2.10, P. 11) required under PE-111511.
- Mines Permit M-247 doesn't identify the District of Wells as a consultative area. e.g. so we're
  not to be provided with Compliance Status Reports (p. 19), Notifications of Activities (p. 19),
  Suspension of Construction or Operations due to Environmental Concerns (p. 32).
  Construction of Environmental management plans (p. 46)

O Key question: How can this near exclusion from the EAC and permits be fixed?

O Key question 2: a) If we're excluded, does the District, do its own monitoring? b) How will those costs be covered (staff & equipment). We don't have the people or money.

#### Communication & Consultation:

- a) cariboogold.com website not being kept up to date, is missing information, such as management plans that are on the EPIC site, as of August, 2025 (the site has since been updated with those plans).
- b) For plans which required our input, we only saw an initial draft in spring, 2024, and had expected further follow-up. Instead, we learned late this summer there would be no further consultation with DoW.
- c) Wells, as the most impacted community, needs information directly, as it happens. At present, there is no requirement the company has to do this, or do it consistently. This needs to be codified and specified. We want everything the Province gets.

- We recognize the company's main duty it to its shareholders, not to Wells. Therefore, as a 'creature of the Province' we (local government) depend on the Province to safeguard our interests and support our well-being.

#### Environmental Assessment

- a) Process not designed to come up with the best solution for all concerned parties.
- b) District of Wells not identified as a key stakeholder requiring special consideration and involvement in the assessment process, but merely as a member of the Technical Advisory Committee where we could, or could not, choose to get involved. (There was also no support

for our involvement – research and review of applications, participation in technical and working groups, augmented community engagement, and post-decision regulatory processes should a project Certificate be issued).

- c) Lack of involvement partly due to lack of capacity and lack of support for research, expertise, staff time, etc.
- d) Wells had a Community Advisory Committee (volunteers) but it was not provided with resources for independent analysis, etc.

Major policy or legislation initiatives typically include opportunities for stakeholder engagement, so there will likely be opportunities for municipalities to provide input from their experience with the EA process. The Environmental Assessment Office EAO assesses whether a proposed project might have significant adverse environmental, social, economic, heritage or health effects. Within each of these categories, the EAO determines individual Valued Components that must be assessed. This may include, for example, potential impacts to wildlife, heritage sites, recreation use, etc. Cumulative effects can be defined as changes to the environment that are caused by an action in combination with other past, present and future human actions. When assessing cumulative effects on valued components, the EAO currently considers the following information: - approved land use plans that designate the most appropriate activities on the land base; - current baseline data that includes the existing effects of past and current activities that overlap with the effects of the proposed project; - consideration of potential overlapping impacts that may be occurring due to other developments, even if not directly related to the proposed projects; and - consideration of future developments that are reasonably foreseeable either proposed public disclosure or have been approved to be built, but are not yet built.

#### **Mineral Tenure Act Modernization**

WHEREAS British Columbia's Mineral Tenure Act has remained substantially unchanged since the 1800s and is not suited to our modern day land base and the demands of legitimate competing interests and values, with the present Mineral Tenure Act giving no weight to other economic activities, current or future, in areas affected by mining claims including tourism, forestry and farming; AND WHEREAS local governments and First Nations deserve greater latitude to shape their economic development paths and protect the full range of their residents interests, and a modern Mineral Tenure Act could ensure adequate regional planning would take place, recognizing vital water, agricultural and other resources on which all communities depend: THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that UBCM request that the Province of British Columbia undertake a broad-based public engagement process similar to that being used to amend BC's Water Act and fairly engage First Nations and local governments to determine how best to modernize the Mineral Tenure Act and related legislation in a way that ensures the full range of interests including social, cultural, ecological and economic are given fair consideration on BC's land base.

### **Provincial Response**

Ministry of Energy Mines Government is open to input on how to ensure BC continues to have a modern and streamlined regulatory framework for the mining sector. The Mineral Tenure Act does have provisions for the interests of the surface rights holders. Formal notification to a landowner is required prior to accessing a claim area that is located on private land. If landowner and claim holders are not able to agree on terms to access a claim, they may ask the Chief Gold Commissioner to mediate and failing that may appeal to the Surface Rights Board. If a claim holder wishes to conduct exploration or mining activity that involves mechanized disturbance, a permit under the Mines Act is required.

### **Priorities Summary**

A summary of the 2025 Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) convention notes, focusing on four key areas of interest for the District of Wells and the surrounding region. Discussions ranged from critical infrastructure needs to economic development and community resilience. The convention provided a platform for local government representatives to engage with provincial ministries and agencies on pressing issues. The following is a synopsis of the discussions related to three-phase power, the Cariboo Gold Project, improvements for historic sites, and wildfire prevention.

#### **3 Phase Power**

The lack of three-phase power to Wells, BC, along the Highway 26 corridor is a significant barrier to future development.

BC Hydro has updated its distribution extension policy ( <a href="https://app.bchydro.com/accounts-billing/electrical-connections/distribution-extension-policy.html">https://app.bchydro.com/accounts-billing/electrical-connections/distribution-extension-policy.html</a>), which now requires the utility to cover more of the costs. While there is capacity on the existing 25kV line. It was indicated that as more of the single phase power is used the 3 phase will continue to be extended (I think)

it was Ajay who said this {to confirm}). Council can't just say that there will be demand, the contractor doing the building will have to contact BC Hydro and possibility put up some security (that can be used against future bills).

- Regarding power outages: The vegetation management budget has gone from \$50 million to \$150 million
  - I also asked about using the mine's powerline (primary or as a backup):
    - Concerns about maintenance by private owner Past situation where growth in a substation got to the point of being dangerous
    - Using the power just for when the main line goes down would require 1) A technical study, 2) an agreement with Barkerville Gold Mines (BGM), followed by 3) approval from the BC Utilities Commission.

### **Taxation for Cariboo Gold Project Clarification**

Details regarding the taxation of the Cariboo Gold Project were discussed in a joint meeting with several provincial ministries.

- Meet with BC Assessment we can tell them when occupation or construction happens (it seemed like they would be happy to hear from us)
- Mentioned the taxation confusion at the joint meeting to Ministry of Mines representative

#### **Tourism**

At the tourism meeting

- Mentioned the impacts on Wells of the current funding model for Barkerville and Cottonwood
- Tourism is focusing on "routes"
- Outdoor Recreation presentation and guide

#### **Wildfire Prevention Investments**

Significant emphasis was placed on wildfire resilience and prevention. The 2026 FireSmart Community Funding and Supports program will have an open intake from October 1, 2025, to September 30, 2026. This funding can be used for various activities, including developing community wildfire resiliency plans, public education. A notable change is that the fuel management program is now separate, with up to \$100,000 available per year for up to two years. Local governments were encouraged to adopt Development Permit Area (DPA) bylaws for wildfire interface areas to enhance building standards for fire resilience. The importance of creating defensible spaces around homes and community assets was repeatedly highlighted, with embers being the primary cause of home ignition during a wildfire. The

province is also investing in new technologies, such as AI fire detection and wildfire detection cameras, to get ahead of wildfires.

#### **Cell Service**

### Topic – Taxation of Heavy Industry – gold mine

### Background: (from the MACC Meeting Request):

- A major mine development, the Cariboo Gold Project, is scheduled to be built in Wells, starting this fall (2025) with production slated for July, 2027. It is an underground mine but a sizeable Mine Site Complex, with a Services Building (concentrator), water treatment plant and electrical sub-station, being built above ground inside the town.
- Wells councillors had an informative meeting with a BCA representative at the 2024 UBCM convention, but more questions have arisen, and with a more clear construction schedule, it would be helpful to have another meeting.

#### BCAA (Graham Held):

- Property valuation is done in a straightforward way, based on value of commodity.
- Clairifed that yes, a mine is taxable and is assessed at the Heavy Industry Rate (Class 4)
- Assessed value won't be as much as the cost of construction. Could compare to other similar mining buildings (e.g. gold mine near Kamloops).
- There is a depreciation schedule, and goes down to no lower than 20%. If shut down, 10%.
- Crown land is assessible, but subject to restrictions. Contaminated site could also qualify as a restriction.
- Assessment schedule begins July 1 of every year, market value, continue assessing up to October 31. Applies to next next year.
- Upon construction start will begin adding improvement value; e.g. if a slab is poured, they start assessing. "Test for occupation".
- Water treatment plant might have exemption if it's for pollution abatement.
- He will connect our CAO (Jerry Dombowsky) with the BCAA lead for this mine site.

- Assessment predicated on premise there will be a mine.

### Topic - Cariboo Gold Project (Wells, BC)

### Background: (from the MACC Meeting Request):

The Cariboo Gold Project will have a huge impact on the District of Wells, in which a major industrial site, the Mine Site Complex will be located, along with other mining-related activities.

- The regulatory framework consists of: Environmental Assessment Certificate (M23-01) issued by the Province after a three+ year environmental assessment
- Mines Act Permit (M-247),
- Environmental Management Act Permits (PE-111511 Mine Site Complex and PE-17686 Bonanza Ledge).

**Meeting Purpose:** To demonstrate that the Cariboo Gold Project Mine Site Complex (MSC) is visibly *in* Wells, not merely *near* it; yet its local government, the District of Wells (DoW) has mostly been left out of consultation and information sharing in EAC and permit conditions for the Project (among other issues); with the goal of getting this fixed, so we are treated as a key stakeholder. We also seek clarification on the EAC amendment process and a better understanding of Compliance and Enforcement for the EAC and Permit requirements.

### **Key points**

- 0.0 Began by asking asking if anyone has been to Wells (not everyone had), followed up by showing aerial views of the current town site and a visual rending of the MSC, its footprint half the size of Wells, and its proximity to homes and buildings.
- (Lack of) Consultation and information sharing with the District of Wells. This mine impacts the very fabric of our town. Yet, DOW not treated as a stakeholder/most impacted community.

- There is a cultural economy that's grown up since industrial mining left in the 1960s (35% based on culture, with estimated 200,000 visiting the area every year). There is leftover infrastructure that makes Wells unique. How can we preserve what we have? (Councillor Van Stralen)
- · Noise is a public concern. Incident reporting database. (Councillor Trotter-Wanner)
- <u>Environmental Assessment Certificate M23-01</u> District of Wells is not required to be consulted for most of the management plans in Schedule B Table of Conditions, just the Community Effects Management Plan, Drinking Water and Water Treatment and one more. In EAC M23-01, DoW is excluded from consultation for:
  - #9. Independent Environmental Monitor terms of engagement (B-7)
  - #10. Construction Environment Management Plan (B-9
  - #11. Care and Maintenance Plan (B-10)
  - #13. Environmental Effects Management Plan (B-11)
  - #14. Caribou Mitigation and Monitoring Plan (B-13)
  - #17. Health and Medical Services Plan (B-19)
  - #19. Human Health Monitoring and Management Plan (B-21)
  - #21. End Land Use Plan
- Environmental Management Act Permit PE-111511 DoW is totally missing from being included. Yet, as the permit states, the gold mine is located \*in\* Wells, BC. (this is the only mention of Wells). This major industrial infrastructure is being built in our town, yet, for instance, we have no representation on the Environmental Monitoring Board (2.10, P. 11) required under PE-111511.
- <u>Mines Permit M-247</u> doesn't identify the District of Wells as a consultative area. e.g. so we're not to be provided with Compliance Status Reports (p. 19), Notifications of Activities (p. 19), Suspension of Construction or Operations due to Environmental Concerns (p. 32). Construction of Environmental management plans (p. 46)
  - O Key question: How can this near exclusion from the EAC and permits be fixed?
  - O Key question 2: a) If we're excluded, does the District, do its own monitoring? b) How will those costs be covered (staff & equipment). We don't have the people or money.

- We recognize the company's main duty it to its shareholders, not to Wells. Therefore, as a 'creature of
  the Province' we (local government) depend on the Province to safeguard our interests and support
  our well-being.
- Environmental Assessment
- a) Process not designed to come up with the best solution for all concerned parties.
- b) District of Wells not identified as a key stakeholder requiring special consideration and involvement in the assessment process, but merely as a member of the Technical Advisory Committee where we could, or could not, choose to get involved. (There was also no support for our involvement research and review of applications, participation in technical and working groups, augmented community engagement, and post-decision regulatory processes should a project Certificate be issued).
- c) Lack of involvement partly due to lack of capacity and lack of support for research, expertise, staff time, etc.
- d) Wells had a Community Advisory Committee (volunteers) but it was not provided with resources for independent analysis, etc.

#### **Overall Response:**

O While they mostly listened, they stated interest in ongoing engagement with us and following up on some of the issues/questions raised. We will need to follow up from our end.

We concluded by saying they would be very welcome to visit Wells at anytime.

I learned later that a couple of relevant resolutions to the Environmental Assessment process had been passed at the 2024 UBCM Convention:

Whereas the environmental assessment review and permitting process for major projects does not adequately identify, consider and proactively address the cumulative social, economic, and infrastructure impacts of these projects on communities; And whereas the environmental assessment process defers consideration of community issues to the management planning and permitting stage where the issues that arise are inadequately addressed in a reactive manner during project implementation: Therefore be it resolved that UBCM urge the Province to ensure that the environmental assessment review process ensures the proactive
