#### CRD HIGHLIGHTS

FROM MAY 12, 2017 meeting

#### SKYFEST EVENT SPONSORED

The CRD Board of Directors endorsed a recommendation from the North Cariboo Rural Directors Caucus to allocate \$4,000 from the North Cariboo Economic Development Function towards Skyfest 2017.

Skyfest is a three-day international airshow taking place at the Quesnel Regional Airport on the August long weekend. The event provides entertainment for

the whole family and brings broad economic benefit to the North Cariboo.

#### CANADA 150 EVENTS SUPPORTED

The Electoral Area Directors approved funding for several upcoming Canada 150 events within the Cariboo Regional District.

The Friends of the Quesnel & District Museum & Archives Society received \$500 in funding for the Cariboo Pioneer Festival in Lebourdais Park on Aug. 11 and 12. The City of Quesnel received \$1,500 towards their 2017 Canada Day celebrations.

#### B.C. REGIONS EMBARK ON CHINA TRADE MISSION

Williams Lake, B.C. – The Cariboo Regional District (CRD) coordinated a trade mission to China with a delegation of Regional District Chairs, Mayors, senior staff and business representatives from B.C. local governments. The goal of the trip was to promote friendship and develop business relationships between the regions of both countries, as well as highlight local B.C. products.

Leaving on May 14, 2017, the delegation visited the People's Republic of China for 10 days touring the cities of Guangzhou, Shenzhen and Shanwei in the Guangdong province; the city of Suzhou in the Anhui province; and the cities of Zhengzhou and Dengfeng in the Henan province. The itinerary included business meetings, municipal facility tours, educational visits, cultural tours and site visits to trade projects.

"The B.C. regions' mission to China is an exciting opportunity to build relationships with a variety of cities in China," states CRD Chair Al Richmond. "I am looking forward to raising awareness about our Cariboo products, such as lumber, plywood, wood pellets, OSB and log homes, along with our tourism and educational opportunities."

This trade mission carries on the work the Cariboo Regional District has been doing to forge new partnerships with groups external to the region, including building connections with China. Over the past year, the CRD and its member municipalities have hosted several Chinese business delegations. The CRD also collaborated with the Cultural Department of the Henan Province to host elite Chinese martial arts performances last summer in 100 Mile House, Williams Lake, Barkerville and Prince George.

These connections have formed positive working relationships and yielded new opportunities, such as the proposed flight school for Thompson Rivers University in Williams Lake. The B.C. regions' mission will build on those relationships and explore further opportunities for joint cultural, educational and economic initiatives.

Local business representatives joined the delegation to promote Cariboo products. Brad Johnson from Sitka Log Homes, Ken Harper from Trinity Post and Panel and Tom Hoffman from Tolko will be representing the Cariboo.

The delegation included CRD Chair Al Richmond, District of Wells Mayor Robin Sharpe, City of Williams

Lake Mayor Walt Cobb, District of 100 Mile House Mayor Mitch Campsall, City of Port Moody Mayor Mike Clay, City of Port Coquitlam Mayor and Metro Vancouver Regional District Chair Greg Moore and several municipal senior staff. Executives from other B.C. businesses also attended, including Meridian RV, Sunwell Farm Technology, Bold Properties and Brew Street Craft and Kitchen.

Members of Vancouver-based Canada China City & Town Friendship Association (CCCTFA) accompanied the delegation to guide the trip and provide translation services. The CCCTFA provided invaluable support through trip coordination, transportation and translation assistance.

The Ministry of International Trade also provided advice and support in mission planning and coordination through their team in B.C. and in China.

## SUNSET THEATRE SEASON ANNOUNCEMENT

The Sunset Theatre's Concert Series presents *Delilah's Samson*, fearless, soulful world folk, funk, rock opera by Seth Macdonald and Shara Gustafson of Mama-guroove on July 19th and the *Ewan Macintyre Band* on July 21, a fusion of Scottish Traditional, Swing, Blue Grass and Jazz. These are concerts not to be missed.

As part of our Presentation Series, *Rock n' Rail* produced by the Other Theatre Company from

Kamloops, BC, will be presenting two plays by Canadian Playwright Mansel Robinson, *Ghost Trains* and *Spitting Slag* with Glen Cairns and Musical Director Kyle Cavanagh. *Rock 'n Rail* is about Life on the railroad, life in the mines. Spoken Word and The Blues. The complex relationships between fathers and sons. It will play over two weekends July 6th, 7th & 8th and 13th, 14th and 15th.

Later in the summer, August 29th and 30th, *A Soldier's War* by Joshua Ramsden Inspired by the war-time letters written by the playwright's grandfather is a story of brotherhood and friendship, honour, and the unrelenting desire to get home.

This will be followed by *Mamahood*, the award winning hilarious ode to motherhood by Nicolle Nattress whose charm, and fearless vulnerability has won over audiences clear across the country. Are you a parent? Then this one is for you – Warning: This show is not suitable for children. Adult Language, Mature Content. *Mamahood* runs September 2nd & 3rd.

Join us as Juno award nominee *Marcel Gagnon* explores the deeper meaning behind his songs and stories "Awakening my people through sweat lodge" sharing his time working for Corrections Canada instilling the importance of the land and his own aboriginal traditions to reconnect to his aboriginal heritage. This new work is part of the Sunset Theatre's Exploration Series which will culminate in a concert on June 30 and July 2nd.

Also part of this year's Exploration Series are two new plays in development, *'The Douglas Project'* by Danette Boucher and *'Into the Roots'* by Nicolle Nattress. *The Douglas Project* explores the story of James Douglas, a high ranking officer for the Hudson's Bay Company during the fur trade and the first Governor of the Colony of British Columbia during its founding gold rush days, and his wife, Amelia, his partner for life. For many years James Douglas has been celebrated as the "Father of British Columbia," but, as our national zeitgeist shifts toward a broader and more diverse version of history, many traditional stories are ripe for re-framing.

*Into the Roots* is about the main character Jackie, when she gets more than she expects as a patient at the School of Dentistry. Join Jackie as she takes a roller-coaster ride back into her teen years, drugs, Rock & Roll and Kevin. Both *The Douglas Project* and *Into the Roots* will be doubled billed on September 8th & 9th.

After several years in development through the Sunset Theatre's Exploration Series, *17* by Morag Northey will have its world premiere August 3rd at the Sunset Theatre before launching a national and international tour of this new work. *17* will run August 3, 5th, 10, 11 & 12.

*17* is a 50-minute theatrical, multi-genre fusion of poetry, prose, cello, voice, storytelling, composition and improvisation that takes its audience on one whale of a ride through Morag Northey's journey as a woman, artist, mother and indomitable spirit. We get a glimpse into the magnitude and depth of this prolific

artist from her labelling at birth as 'reluctant debutante,' to premonitions as a young girl that foreshadowed the suicide of a good friend's daughter, to comforting whistles she vigorously emitted while working in one of Canada's leading psychiatric institutions, that kept 'would be' perpetrators at bay. During *17*'s final refrain, having traversed a raw and challenging landscape, the audience is brought to a place of understanding that in our troubles 'we are not alone.'

Morag Northey is an outstanding cellist, award-winning composer, writer, producer, singer and teacher. As a soloist, Morag has played exclusive engagements for the 2010 Olympics, Governor General of Canada Michaëlle Jean and the 2015 Canada Winter Games. Over her 35-year career, she has played in numerous orchestras, chamber ensembles, musical theatre productions and musicians which include Tony Bennett, Linda Ronstadt and Lyle Lovett.

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## MINING THE HISTORY OF WELLS REGIONAL DISTRICT

The CRFC is pleased to announce the new recipients of the Radiometres program. A total of \$1,487,751 has been awarded to 34 stations. CFRD 92.5, Wells Community Radio, was one of the successful stations and qualified for \$20,000 in funding for a 2017 recording project.

Karen Jeffery will be spear-heading this project which will lead to capturing the stories and animation of Wells and the people who live here, supporting the creation of more in-depth programming, podcasts, and live performance. The program will also provide employment and training opportunities for different participants. Jeffery adds "Not only will we be producing relevant content for CFRD, we will be capturing living history. It will be archived, making the content available to other organizations, national broadcasting libraries and provide content for future development."

The history of Wells and surrounding area is steeped in great mystery, discovery, hard work and hardship. These historical memories are on the verge of being lost forever as the population of settlers and modern residents, peppered throughout the region, will soon be lost to time. Before it's too late, CFRD will invite these 'gems' of our society to tell their stories in a welcoming and nurturing environment by conducting recorded non-threatening casual conversations about their life and times. This process will be in part mentored by a seasoned Radio Producer who will be able to pass on their knowledge to the community team at CFRD.

The poignancy of capturing the people of Wells before we lose the opportunity is apparent from recent community losses. In keeping with the Exploration Series at the Sunset Theatre, the premise for this grant was that each interview that is conducted forms the basis for the next phase of development in a variety of forms: radio play? stage play? movie? local interest? Each of these vignettes will showcase the local musicians who live in the area and some of their songs will underscore the segments. There will also be the opportunity to capture some live performances that are offered throughout various venues during the year.

This is a 'creative' grant specifically to support the 'programming content' for the radio station. Through mentorship and training and working with other organizations and individuals in town, the CFRD will hopefully be able to build a library of content that is worthy of national radio play and be picked up by other radio stations as well.

As an ongoing project, the time frame for the initial phase is one year with hopefully further funding to continue at the end of this time period. In the coming weeks, a more detailed plan as to how it will all unfold will be developed. # OBITUARY



Frances Louise (Wee) Gilbert July 2, 1930 – April 6, 2017 was born in Vancouver and resided in Wells with family from 1934. She is survived by her children Michael Wallace and Aleta, Sally Wallace and Steve, Tim Wallace and Michele, Eileen Wallace and Sam, grand-children Mary, Dianna, Nicholas, Bradley, Ryan, Jeffery, Brooke, Derrick, and Danielle, great-grandchildren Mercedes, Shannon, Phoebe, Bentley, sister Joan Hughes and Ellis, brother Art

Gilbert and Donna, nieces and nephews and many special friends. She was predeceased by parents Jack and Edna Gilbert, brother George Gilbert.

Wee worked after school and Saturdays at the Wells Produce, then the Govt. Telephone and Telegraph Office, Pacific Western Planer Mill and Beaver Planer Mill in Quesnel, and Govt. Tel. and Tel. in Terrace. She and Arnie and Family lived in Abbotsford, then Kamloops where their children grew up. On March 25th we all were around the kitchen table playing a rousing game of "five-in-a-row". Over the next week-and-a-half her health declined rapidly. She was admitted to the hospice house here in Kamloops on April 2nd and completed her life's journey about 9:00 PM on April 6th.

Her children, their spouses, several grandchildren and friends in the area kept the vigil and most of them were there to the end.

Her children have set aside the weekend of July 29/30, 2017 to inter her ashes at the Wells/Barkerville Cemetery. The family will determine the appropriate Celebration of Life to commemorate Frances Louise (Wee) Gilbert. Any announcements regarding such will be posted, printed, or mailed as needed.
